2011 Summer Reading Wrap-up

Approximately 218 children, age two through fifth grade, enrolled in the Children's Summer Reading Program, "One World, Many Stories", at the Central Library and East Branch reading a total of 2,109 hours. Programs featuring ventriloguists, magicians and storytellers engaged and entertained audiences at both library locations with approximately 780 people attending the 20 scheduled programs. An average of 110 children participated in the weekly prize drawings.

The 2011 adult summer reading program, "A Novel Destination", was a big success with 70 people participating and a total of 492 books read! Our grand prize winner, Janice Miller, won a \$50 Walmart gift card. Weekly prizes were also given away to participants. Prizes were made possible through the generosity of the Friends of the Library.

Twenty-seven teens participated in the 2011 summer reading program, "You Are Here", and read a total of 2,821 chapters and 141 books.
