Spotlight on Downton Abbey

If you are a big fan of the PBS series Downton Abbey, you might also enjoy:

Upstairs, Downstairs (DVD)-Downton Abbey owes much to this popular series from the 70s about the lives of the aristocratic Bellamy family and their servants. A new sequel to Upstairs, Downstairs aired on PBS last year with more episodes to come next year.

The Buccaneers (DVD)-Based on a book by Edith Wharton, *The Buccaneers* traces the lives of four young American heiresses who go to England to find titled husbands.

The House at Riverton by Kate Morton-When Grace was a young girl she worked as a maid with the Hartford family. One summer, a young poet allegedly commits suicide at the house, an event which Grace knows something about. Many years later, Grace is in her 90s and a film director comes asking questions about what happened.

The American Heiress by Daisy Goodwin-Heiress Cora Cash leaves her Rhode Island home to marry a man with a title. She becomes the Duchess of Wareham but her marriage isn't what she expected and it is difficult fitting in with the British aristocracy.

The Dressmaker by Kate Alcott-Tess travels aboard the *Titanic* as personal maid to Lady Lucile Duff Gordon. This novel focuses not only on the tragedy of the *Titanic* but its aftermath.

The Remains of the Day by Kazuo Ishiguro-In this novel that was adapted into a film, a butler looks back on his 30 years of service to the Darlington family and how much it has cost him.

The World of Downton Abbey by Jessica Fellowes-This nonfiction book not only gives details about the making of the show but also gives readers an inside look at life during that time period.
