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
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

presentation of the class play, "Look ho's Here." The highlight of the year was the Junior-Senior Banquet. Thich was a success. The ladies in fashionable evening gowns, the men groomed to the nth degree, the colorful evening has left a lasting impression upon us.

We lost six students at the close of our Junior year.

The year 1937 found us a class of dignified Seniors. We chose as officers: President, Ruth Purdy, Vice-President, Charles Allison, Secretary and Treasurer, Doris Reed. Sponsor, Mr. Egger. We gained three new Seniors making us a class of nine.

Out of the Senior class, one girl, Poris Reed, participated in basketball for four years.

A modern minstrel was sponsored by the Juniors, March 2nd, in which the Seniors participated. It turned out to be a great success. The Seniors gave a Monior play April 29. Its name, "Gay".

Our work for this year is well represented in the Senior publication of the year book, and we want to thank Mr. Egger for his untiring effort to make this year book a success. We wish to express our gratitude to the teachers who have so generously helped us in our activities and our studies. We were also glad to make the acquaintance with three new teachers, Miss Agnes Raugabaugh, Mr. Kenneth Carpenter, and Mr. Ray Reavely.

KILLBUCK F.F.A.

This school year, 1937-38 is the first for a Vocational Agriculture course in our high school. Of course the first thing for us to do was to learn how the course should be conducted and that should be expected of us as students in it. After several weeks of school during which time we had become acquainted with the system of instruction used in this course and what other boys were doing with projects and how they were benefiting by being organized as a local chapter of Future Farmers of America, we voted unanimously to apply for an F. F. A. charter. After receiving our charter we held an election and filled the offices that belong to an F.F.A. chapter. Those elected were, President, Joe Doyle; Vice President, Ralph Reed; Secretary, Earl Haun; Treasurer, Willis Hiller; Reporter, Donovan Ling and Watch Dog, Albert Garver. Other members were John Waltman, Jerald Boyd, Bernard Gallion, Jimmie Carpenter, and Paul Fraelich. During the year Bernard Gallion and bonovan Ling left school and Paul Fraelich was appointed to act as Reporter during the remainder of the year.

Soon after organizing we decided that we should have some definite objectives to work toward. The program was centered around nine objectives to develop us into all-around F.F.A. members. They were: Supervised Practice, Leadership, Scholarship, Social and Recreational, cooperative, Community Service, Character Building, Publicity Activities, and conduct of Meetings and Classes.



This year under supervised practice, six boys bought purebred registered gilts, one took several purebred Ayshire calves from his father's farm to manage and two members are buying 6 weeks old pullets to grow into layers.

Under leadership Activities we have done several things. We entered teams in the State Apple Juaging contest, sent delegates to the State Leadership Conference held at Ohio State University in January. Ralph Reed, Jimmie Carpenter and Paul Fraelich were on the Apple Judging team and Ralph and Paul were also delegates to the Leadership Conference. The leadership Conference was held for the purpose of bringing together members from different F.F.A. chapters and point out the good work being done by various chapters. Some told how they conducted their meeting, others tola how they made money, some told of trips they had taken and in fact anything worth chile that they had successfully done. In our own chapter we have spent some time on Parlimentary procedure in order to know how to properly conduct a meeting.

Last winter an initiation team from Millersburg F.F.A. came and initiated our members into the Green Hand Degree.

Social and Recreational activities will come mostly during the summer when we plan to have a meeting each month and have games and refreshments.



During the year we formed a cooperative association of which John Waltman was elected manager. So far we have not handled much business except the purchase of some mineral feeds for all the members. However we are organized so that unen we need to act cooperatively for any purpose we have the machinery set up to go it.

In the way of community service, our department has tested soil samples tested milk and Mr. Wells conducted a series of 20 evening classes for the benefit of farmers in the community. Although no special sessions have been held on character building, Mr. Wells has frequently called to our attention how certain acts will have a favorable or unfavorable effect upon others and indirectly influence our own welfare.
