
Class History

We selected our class color "Orchid and Silver" and our class flower "American Beauty Rose." The highlights of the year were the Junior Class Play, "Girl Shy" and the Junior-Senior Banquet. It was held May 14, at Fisher's Restaurant in Millersburg, after which a show was enjoyed at Schine Theatre in Wooster. Miss Raudabaugh was our class sponsor. We also purchased our class rings that year and helped prepare the year book.



- 9. "Bob" Foreman-leaves his heighth and ability to play basketball to "Jimmey" Carpenter.




- 10. Deland Geib-his ability to miss school and still keep up with his studies to "Chick" Purdy.







The Home Economics Class of K.H.S. has an enrollment of owenty six girls.

At the beginning of the term, the class was organized into a Home Economic Club. We chose "Jolly Eckers" as our club name, "Success comes in cans, I can, you can, we all can," as our club motto and "Girls of Home Ec" as our club song.

The following officers were elected president, Dorothy Shrimplin, Vice President, Marcella Clark, Sec. Helen McFadden, Treas. Rita Schodorf.

The Home Ec Club holds monthly meetings at the time which class work is put into practice.

Among the social events that were sponsored by the Home Economics Club: a Halloween Masquerade Party given in the high school gym to which all high school students were invited and a Thanksgiving supper to which the girls invited their friend.

At Christmas time we made pop corn balls and treated the teachers, high school and the Junior High Students. We also distributed boxes of cookies and candies to the aged people.

The first semester's work consisted of cooking, of which canning was the main feature.

Throughout the semester approximately eighty cans of fruit and vegetables were turned out by the class.

The second semester's work consisted chiefly of sewing. After learning the fundamental stitches, we started on the first of the three projects which we are to complete this semester. The first project consisted of a white cooking uniform and head band. These uniforms are to be worn in next year cooking class. The second project consisted of a dress and the third options.



Activities of the Killbuck chapter of uture Farmers of America must have looked ttractive to boys who were not in the Department of Vocational Agriculture last year. When school closed one year ago there were nine F.F.A. nembers. When school opened last fall nineteen boys reported for enrollment.

Officers for the year were as follows: President, Paul Fraelich; Vice-President, Jimmie Carpenter; Secretary, Albert Garver; Treasurer, Ralph Reed; Reporter, Jerald Boyd; Watch Dog, Joe Doyle.

Due to his ability as a chairman, Paul Fraelich was elected candidate for membership on the newly-organized Holmes County Junior Fair Board. One member was to be elected to this board to represent both the Killbuck and Glenmont chapters. At a joint meeting, a coin was flipped to determine whether the Killbuck or Glenmont candidate should represent them. Paul won the toss.

The secretary, Albert Garver; the treasurer, Ralph Reed; and the Vice President, Jimmie Carpenter, all deserve special mention for their good work in their respective offices.

Four members, Ralph Reed, John Waltman, Albert Garver and Jerald Boyd went with a group of members from Glenmont on an educational tour last summer with Mr. Wells, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Crosby, and Superindendant Bateman of Glenmont. Gettysburg, Baltimore, Annapolis, Washington, Mt. Vernon, the Sky-line Drive, Home of Thomas Jefferson and many other points of interest were seen and visited. One thousand two hundred miles were traveled and the trip took six days. The cost to each boy was ten dollars.

A new feature of F.F.A. activities this year have been the night meetings once each month. Basketball has been the chief amusement.



The refreshment committees have done good work and have been well supported by all the members. These meetings have been occasions for eating many sandwiches, much fine take and fruit-jello and drinking many cubs of rich hot chocolate, accompanied by many jokes. But there were always dishes to wash.

All the boys who were members last year are carrying on their livestock projects this year. All members are starting a crop project of some kind. Crop projects are divided between Hybrid Corn and potatoes.

The outstanding project development this year has been the fine litter of pigs belonging to John Waltman. John expects to make the Ohio Ton-litter award this year.

Our work this year has been based on farm crops and proper soil treatment to produce them, including pastures.

Several special trips were taken by the members or by representatives of the members. Early in the fall, we were guests of the Farm Bureau at their fertilizer plant in Alliane. In November we attended the meeting of the Ohio Farm Bureau at Columbus. During Farmers Week we sent delegates to the F.F.A. Leadership Conference at Ohio State University. LLoyd Hawkins and Claude Lawson were delegates and James Allison, Albert Garver and John Waltman were the apple judging team.

One purpose we have had during the year was to do what we could toward overcoming the ravages of erosion and to begin laying the foundation for some income from land on our farms that is now practically worthless for crop production of any kind. First we had Mr. Dowd of the Forestry Department of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station come and talk to us on Reforestation. Then each member sent to the Experiment Station five hundred trees



which the experiment station furnished free of charge to our members. These we have planted as a class project. This amounts to about ten acres of land that we have reforested. Mostly White Pine was planted but some Ash and Poplar were also planted.

We could not pass through a school year as members of the Killbuck F.F.A. without entering into some contests. Last fall we played Glenmont in soft-ball several times, had a basketball game with them this winter, and entered into a pest-hunt contest with Glenmont, Millersburg, Big Prairie and Nashville. Last year we won a similar contest but we were beaten this year. The three losers were to feed the two winners. The winners were Millersburg and Nashville. We were hosts to the group. About eighty five boys were present. The early part of the evening was occupied by determining which of the five chapters had the best basketball team. Big Prairie won. Refreshments consisted of pie and ice cream.

About the last big event of our 1938-39 year was the banquet held in conjunction with the girls of the Home Economics Club. This banquet was held on April 29. Both the girls and we invited our parents in to this banquet. This banquet has become an annual affair and we feel that it was a fitting climax to our year of F.F.A. activities.
