





#### KILLBUCK F. F. A.

Bernard McKelvey as President, and with the help of Don Taylor as Vice-President, brought our chapter through another successful year. Other officers: Lloyd Hawkins as Secretary, James Allison as Treasurer, Earl Smith as reporter and John Ling as watchdog.

Nineteen boys have continued their work in the Department of Vocational Agriculture throughout the year. Members, in addition to the officers are: Carl Allison, Dean Croskey, Delbert Gallion, Bob Hoxworth, Maurice Mohler, Robert Patterson, Max Reed, Rodney Ridenbaugh, John Snyder, Jimmie Carpenter, Albert Garver, Ralph Reed, John Waltman.

Vocational Agriculture has been taught under a slightly different system this year. Instead of devoting two periods per day to Farm Shop, with the Freshman and Sophomores, this double period has been used to teach a Junior-Senior Class in Farm Machinery. To replace the Farm Shop Course, part of the time during the year has been spent in the shop by Freshman and Sophomores in order to build such equipment as they have found they needed in their livestock or crop projects at home.

Night meetings have been held regularly once a month. As usuall, basketball was the chief source of recreation after which refreshments have always been served.

Killbuck won the County F. F. A. pest hunt. The payoff and F. F. A. basketball tournament was held at Nashville. The payoff consisted of home made icecersam and cake.

The annual Parent-Son Banquet was a decided success this year. At the banquet some of the members received letters for achievement in F. F. A. and Vocational Agriculture activities. One Ton-litter award was made at the banquet to John Waltman. John has a chance of making another Ton-litter this year. Albert Garver will probably achieve the same honor.

Ralph Reed raised an average of a little more than 99 bushels of corn to the acre on 5.4 acres. John Waltman was a close second with 93 bushels per acre.

Other features of the work during the past year were trips to the Ohio Agriculture Experiment Farm, Leadership Conference at Ohio State University and Cleveland Union Livestock Yards and Swift Packing Plant.

F. F. A. TRIP

The annual educational trip was the outstanding event of the year. This trip was a joint trip with Glenmont F. F. A. Nine of the present members went on this trip. They were: James Allison, John Ling, Maurice Mohler, Bernard McKelvey, Earl Smith, Don Taylor, Jimmie Carpenter, Ralph Reed, John Waltman. This trip took members over 2600 miles within a period of eleven days. Accompanying the nine members were a few other Killbuck High School students, drivers of the seven cars, and members of the Glenmont F. F. A. There were 35 persons altogether. Camps were arranged for, ahead of time, and each car supplied with the itinerary, but every effort was made to travel together which became impossible once in a while.

The first stop was the World's Poultry Congress at Cleveland. Camp was made at Erie, Pa. Lunch was eaten next day at Niagara Falls. Next evening camp was made at Toronto, Canada. From there the group went through Peterboro and on to Ottawa where they walked about the Capitol buildings of the Dominion of Canada. From Ottawa the itinerary led to Montreal. Here the group reached camp late in the evening. The next morning as soon as breakfast was prepared and eaten and all equipment packed, the boys were on their way to Quebec.

On the way to Quebec some strange sights were seen. Carts pulled by oxen and tobacco growing in the fields were some of the unusual things. A halt was made at Quebec where the group rambled about over the Plains of Abraham and climbed up the defenses of old Fort Quebec where Wolfe and Montcalm fought. All cars were driven on to a ferry along with about a hundred other cars and taken across the St. Lawrence River. From this point the cars were headed toward the Vermont State Line. Already behind schedule on account of the many miles traveled that day, the group encountered a severe rain and thunderstorm. Darkness overtook the travelers miles from their objective that evening. Finally camp was established in a French-speaking garageman's parking lot in Sherbrook, Canada.

The next day was spent in Vermont, N. Hampshire, and Massachusets. Next morning the battle grounds at Lexington and Concord were visited. A hasty tour of Boston and Bunker Hill Monument permitted the group to get on its way toward a beach where they enjoyed a bath in the Atlantic. After bathing and eating lunch the group soon found itself in Plymouth where Plymouth Rock and other sights were seen. The evening trek was across Rhode Island through Providence, into Connecticut, through Hartford and camped in a State Park.

The next day the boys camped at Farmingdale Long Island on the campus of a State School of Voc. Agriculture. They attended the World's Fair and toured New York City.
